THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Brothers,

It gives me great pleasure to inform the Brotherhood that the state of the House is strong and improving. Over the summer, we did some needed renovations to the second and third floor hallways. We are welcoming in twelve new brothers this Semester. Our Undergrads continue to add value on campus and in the community at large. Sadly, since the last installment of the Rho News, we said goodbye to Ned Jesser '39. He was a leader to the House and to the College—and served both with distinction and dignity. We are looking forward to Homecoming 2007 and we feel confident about DKE's future at Lafayette.

Although there are reasons to be hopeful about our future, we do face significant challenges to our continued success and indeed survival on campus. The most significant challenge to the House continues to be the budget. These challenges have been causing difficulties since 2005 when Lafayette made significant changes to the way money is allocated to DKE. I realize that in the past we have been able to get by with the generous and frequent contributions of some; however, I think it is unfair for us to continue to ask and expect the same folks to step up and carry the House for all of us. To keep pace with other renovations and new construction at Lafayette, we continue to make improvements to the House. Over the summer, the second and third floors were re-done—they look good. Dan Carreno '04 will go into more detail on this project in this newsletter and will further elaborate on this and possible future projects at our noon meeting at Homecoming. Although the House is looking better, we continue to lag other living groups on campus (notably other Greek organizations) in terms of appearance and amenities. We will need to close the gap if we are going to remain competitive in our recruiting efforts.

Dear Brothers,

The financial challenges facing our house continue as we adapt to the drastically reduced budget from Lafayette that went into effect in 2005. Our operating account has maintained a steady balance, but we have been unable to realize the growth necessary to keep our house on par with the higher quality living arrangements available on campus, including other fraternities. There are a great number of programs and events that we would like to put together, but as it stands now, we struggle to fund a homecoming celebration with the amenities that we are accustomed to.

We have been very creative in finding ways to improve our financial standing. Some of the initiatives that we have explored are: submitting house improvement items to Lafayette's renovation budget; asking our undergraduates to pay for the liability insurance provided through DKE International; requesting a rate of return for our capital improvement account with Lafayette; utilizing alumni expertise to realize a greater rate of return for our House Association account; and continuing to revise our budget with Lafayette to ensure that they are living up to their requirements under our lease.

Despite all of our efforts, we still need an increased commitment from our alumni if we are to maintain the high standard set throughout the 152 year history of our chapter. Lafayette continues its commitment to the improvement of their students and their facilities, and our house must improve alongside them to provide a society and facility that is attractive to today's student.

There are two ways to provide funds to the house. The first is by writing FOR DKE on any donation to Lafayette which goes into our capital improvement account (tax deductible). The second is through your dues and sinking fund contributions which go to our House Association operating account (not tax deductible). It is imperative that we maintain a solid balance in both accounts so that we have the flexibility to use our funds to satisfy the most pressing need.

I hope to see all of you at homecoming 2007 where I would be happy to discuss any of the aforementioned issues, or any other ideas you may have. I would also like to thank you in advance for your generous support of our great fraternity.

I would like to use this installment of the Rho News to update all alumni on the status of the DKE House. It is my pleasure to report that our main initiative over the summer was a great success. The flooring on the second and third floors has been completely replaced in both the corridors as well as the inner rooms. The tile floor in the corridors has been replaced with a hardwood composite floor which came highly recommended for durability. We can only hope this investment will withstand the test of time, and more importantly, the test of DKE in the years to come. The inner room flooring has been replaced with carpeting and although we cannot expect the same longevity there, replacing the carpet at certain intervals is something we are capable and willing to do.

For those of you that have not had to pleasure to return to the house and see for yourself, both the Alumni Association as well as our undergrad brothers are in agreement that this project has resulted in a vast improvement. Gentlemen: I am pleased to share with you some perspectives on the happenings on campus.

1) Alumni Association: The LCAA boasts more than 27,000 members and 100 committee members are working hard to stay connected and relevant to all of you. If you have not already done so, register for the "Online Community" on the alumni page of the website. More than 4000 alums have, but we want everybody! It is a fast and efficient way to stay in touch with Lafayette. Similarly, you can get a daily email about campus news and happenings and the monthly Marquis Mailer (available to alums only) by registering on the same site. You can also register for a free electronic issue of the on campus newspaper if you like. You can order stuff from the school store (including the new Lafayette commissioned Vineyard Vine ties). You high rollers can order the Hermes scarf commemorating the Marquis' 250th birthday. These are offered through the Skillman library.

The alumni offered an "orientation to Life" program last spring to seniors. The program was well attended and introduced attendees facing the working world to topics ranging from 401(k)s to medical benefits to credit issues. We are looking to build on this and are considering more such events. The alumni networking events and chapters (we have 53 of them) are growing and attracting more and more loyal alums. Go to one of these events; you won't be disappointed. The College's externship program continues to grow and introduce current students to alumni in their professional settings. Go to the alumni magazine links on the alumni webpage to read about this program.

2) The College: Lafayette received a record number of applications (>6300) in 2006. Approximately 34% of applicants were admitted and 592 matriculated. The diversity of the Freshman class continues to grow with >20% being students of color. 962 international students applied; 40 enrolled.

The campus is vibrant and in good shape and the facilities amaze me every time I visit campus. I toured the new Varsity Football House last month with Coach Tavani. It is amazing. Better than many pro teams' facilities. Check it out when you're on campus. I think there will be some tours offered on nongame days.

Dan Weiss is doing and excellent job as our College President. Dan is smart, approachable and knows how to get things done. He and his wife, Sandra, live in the President's house on the edge of campus with their 2 young sons. Dan has done an excellent job already and is planning for Lafayette's continued success. The Trustees will review a proposed strategic plan for Lafayette at the Trustee's meeting on October 20, 2007.

The Marquis' 250th anniversary attracted a lot of attention to the campus and helped the College build its relationship with Easton. The first ever night football game against Marist was a success, drawing 9000 fans.

3) Ned Jesser: I would be remiss if I did not acknowledge with great sadness the passing of one of our great DKE leaders. Edward A. ("Ned") Jesser '39 was one of the first alumni brothers I had the good fortune to meet. He was a very loyal supporter of the College and DKE (including his service as President of the RHO House Association for several years before Matt Sheeleigh). Ned was a welcoming and friendly face to all who entered the DKE house and was a steady hand to us over the years. Ned will be missed.
